


Rendering of the attack on the Stewart family's boat by the Cherokee on the Tennessee River






Attack on Fort Nashboro, April 2nd, 1781








Nave of the First Presbyterian Church






ATTACK OF THE GUNBOATS ON FORT DONELSON.

The view is south-west. The attack of General Smith was from the ground behind the house on the right.






Deforested view of Nashville during its occupation by the Union Army during the Civil War






The Battle of Franklin – Nov. 30, 1864






Nashville & Chattanooga Station, Approx. 1864 In the gulch near Church Street










